Double pneumonia. He had that way back. That poison. (Speaks in Cherokee with Sakey)

(Mom when they's growin' up, did they raise any gardens?)

Maggie speaks in Cherokee.

Yeah, they always raise somethin.

(Did they grind the corn for their bread?)

BAKING BREAD-COFFEE SUBSTITUTE

Maggie speaks in Cherokee.

(Maggie speaks in Cherokee with Sakey.) Yeah, they baked brick bread.

They make corn and stuff like that with the brick. And they hada

pound so they could pound on that stuff. We don't have anymore like

that. Nobody don't make those pounders. Sure would like to get one

just to a (unclear). I aimed to ask Hooley to make me one, long as he

was living. I mean as long as he was able to do it. I just can't anymore.

(How 'bout, did they drink a lot of coffee back then, too?)
