(Half Kiowa, Your mother is a Kiowa?)

Yes, and my dad is Cherokee. Now really I kinda fudge on that, I say I'm full-blood Cherokee, I mean full-blooded Indian, but my dad, his birth certificate shows that he's only half Cherokee.

(Oh, really?)

Uh-huh, So, but he claims to be three-fourths Cherokee.

(So there was a yoneg (meaning white in Cherokee) in the wood pile somewhere)

(Laughter) Right.
