nomatic tribes in your region and move to the bottom third of the original Indian Territory. So, your tribes as I tried to explain earlier will be moved from Kansas and Nebraska. But in addition, you'll have other tribes brought in from other states. In fact, one tribe brought from old Mexico, and located here in their new home. So, in most cases, the small tribes like the Kaw Indians and the Ponca and the Wichita, Cheyenne and Arapaho, all those tribes—they were most reluctant; they didn't want to move. But the Federal Government said, "You'll move."

Then, they will resist some, but most of them by the early 1870's will be living in their new homes. That's the reason when we refer to it as the second Trail of Tears. Marty, by my time, have you been having to break at 8:15 or 45? Why don't we just take a little break. Is that the—is it been the custom each time?

Marty in background: Break's at your choice.

Mr. Turnbow: Well, I mean, let me ask you this. Have you been doing that form? So, let's go through the form, and I don't want to bore you to death. PERIOD OF THE BOOMERS (1870-1880'S)
