And he'll assemble up here in Chautauqua, Kansas, and there they will heed under his leadership. You'll have people that will actually try to infiltrate. In other words, it would as far south as the Unassigned Land. Unsuccessful, but at least they will make the attempt, and the Federal Government under the presidency of Samuel J. Tilden--Rutherford B. Hayes, excuse me, he will actually use Federal troops in pushing these, would be invaders out. Carpenter followed by an individual even more determined. He had a lot of the ideas of Boudinot that he actually carried it out, David L. Payne. Payne for four years will try eight different times to invade the Cherokee property. and certainly try to get here. Each time, he will be pushed away. You'll have others that will try the same thing. Now, what I'm doing all this? All the clamoring of the late 1870's and '80's will give rise to the runs that you are so familiar with. I'm sure you heard many times the runs in the Cherokee Outlet and other places. Finally, on March the 3rd, 1889, a law will pass Congress that read something like this: All the unoccupied lands of the tracts ceded by the
