took care of that medicine. And (8) hanging around. That's her brother Hanging around there, taking care of that medicine. Old Man got sick and passed away so it fall on her. So she just took care of it till she got sick and then it fall in our hands. Now we are taking care of it. (And who will get the medicine after you?) I don't know. After Freddy passes away, I don't know who's going to get it, I ain't going to take it ... ain't going to take care of it. (Is it a lot of trouble to take care of?) Lot of rules. (Lot of pules?) Yeah. Can't take a kitty or a baby crying in there. (You can't take what?) Baby. (Why can't you do that?) Something bad happen...bad luck will come to the house. (Are there any other miles like that?) And you can't take nothing alive...with four feet in there ... a little bird or any pet. You can't take it in there or keep it where the mer ine tied up. If they run in there ... stay in there for four, three or two days, they die. (Where do you keep the medicine?) Tied up above our bed on the west side. (Is it always on the west sode, or east side, or ...?) No, always on the west side. (Do you know where they came from?) I don't know. (Are they very old?) They're old. (How many are there?)

I don't know. The Apaches got three of them I think. Kiowas they got ten.
