It was just clear and pretty, all different colors. They all were different colors. And we used to crawl just so far just to see it. They say when you sneak up on it, it don't bubble. Well, when it hear noise, it bubble, they say. And we'd crawl so far and get up there, and that thing would be bubbling away. We used to go around there a whole lot, at Zodlton. We'd climb the mountain and go on down there. That spring is cold. But I don't think it was ever hot. My grandpa say one of them (springs) was real cold. He never did say which one, but one of them was really cold. He'll tell us not to get in there. Well, boy, I didn't want to get in there. Wouldn't want to get in there.

(Has Zodlton ever dried up?)

Not that I know of. Till after my cousin moved away, I don't know what happened after that but I don't ever remember them springs going dry. They're always full. But the one that's concrete, always. But the others seems like they was in to the ground, that's all. (N.B. The main spring at Zodlton has the remains of a concrete basin round it.)
