(Yeah, that's where he's buried.)

You know his wife died and I dan't know it till afterwards. And they had it over at Nowata and I don't know whether they buried her there or not.

(Yeah, she's buried there.)

That is old lady Roxey. His first wife was buried there I know.
(Both of them.)

Well, I hope she was. I went to look when I was down there not long ago to a funeral. It's all growed up in brush. Don't look like anybody cares anything about it anymore. Now that up at Oglesby, we have a workman there clean that up twice a year. That's a nice graveyard there.

(Yes, it is.)

You've been to it, have you? Last year they was some of them boys down in there. Roy Bosser, he's one of the old timers. He lives on the old Ringo place. Used to be Ringo store there, there in the bottom, way back years ago.

Them Painters is in there. McNamms. It's on this side of Oglesby.

Yeah, went into business there. Jimmy died around Post there.

Henderson's place. We worked till four o'clock in the evening getting that done. It was just as hard as that cement. Got down to that old sandrock and we didn't have no tools then, just an old pick and shovel. We didn't get it too deep. Buried the Doc real pretty in the evening. Emerson Coonrod. One boy was killed in the Civil War. His tombstone's there. And that's—and there's one other tombstone I think that's Watkins. He was—married a Watkins one of these Coonrod girls. 'Cause I know I help bury this Watkins woman. She was a Coonrod. Then there was a Elly—I can't think of her name either. Elly, I know was her first name. Her man was buried out here in the Osage. That's all the grave—tombstone: He's been out
