No. They didn't then. First church that was built in this neighborhood was right up there. Adn I sold them land for the Assembly right down there.

(Yeah. And did this community have it's own cemetery?)

No. We got family cemeteries. No, all the burials here either go to Miami or Seneca or Wyandotte. Few got to Wyandotte. We've got a lot of them buried here. (Interruption) They call it Flint Graveyard. But that's where all the old Indians are buried.

(Yeah. It's two miles east and a--)

A quarter south.

Yeah, pretty near half- a-mile south.

(Do they still use this, too?)
