This girl that played Annie Oakley she was a blonde.

EARLY OTTAWA MEETING PLACES

(Did the Ottawas ever have their own meeting house, Tom? Back in the early days?)

No, they didn't have Indian meeting houses. They more or less were formed in with the different churches, you know. 'Course my father he taken me up with the Baptist.

(Then they didn't have a meeting ground or dance ground?)

Oh, they had grounds where they met, you know.

(Yeah.)

They built these here brush arbors you know. And they had their churches under this here brush arbor.

(Yeah. Is the Oftawa language still preserved?)

(Coughs) Excuse me. Yeah.

(Well that's good.)

Yeah, it's still -- yeah, few of them, they still speak it. But I was --
