My goodness -- And often I meet people of the old time that they went there.

Yeah, you know just in the last few years the Cherokee nation has, they
done a whole lot towards improving themselves. And as with the, by their
own activities and efforts they built -- oh, the office complex out there
at Parkhill. That big Cherokee Restaurant and the Arts and Crafts Center.

Then they got that Cherokee Village. And then that play they put on during
the summer. And then all throughout the Cherokee nation they got, oh community
centers. And you know, they're doing a lot of work improving their living
conditions. And then of course they've got housing programs. And lot of them
need help too. But they're helping themselves now.)

They government's kind of helping them you know.

(Yeah. And especially among the young people. They're getting interested in getting better educations. And higher education.)

Build them a home, you know. They help one another, you know, build. Government will help them.

(If they'd just started say, thirty or forty years ago, they'd been -- well, they'd really been a way up there now in progress.)

Lot of them Indian boys and girls, both, over there pretty smart.

(You bet they are. And-they're producing a lot of good managers and artists and professional people.)

Yeah, sure are.

(Well, you've seen also a lot of changes come to Muskogee too, haven't you?)
Oh, yeah.

(Boy, that Muskogee is a growing place!)

Yeah. Yeah. Then you'd go down streets you wouldn't see nothing but horses, you know.
