Maybe, it's because--well, I have observed different ones, and they wait for another one to speak; and if that doesn't speak, they just sit, and they don't give their own opinion. And if a question is asked, they sit there. And if no one ever calls on them, they never make any verbal decisions or anything like that. It's just--they just automatically go with whatever is suggested, which isn't good at all. They should voice their opinion in all this. And also, I don't have any criticisms among the Indian churches at all. But I am a member of the Midway Baptist Church, which is five miles south of Wewoka. I've been there since I was thirteen years old although my mother was a member of the Highspring Indian Baptist Church, near Konawa. And during this period of time, I always went down with her during church meetings and all this. I understood the language.
