store, right there. Boy that's an old one, too, and Graves, that run the Rogers' store, had a house right across there, and the banker he lived right there, see that shed up there you used to see another nice home in there and Wilmuth, we'll go on up here a little farther, Wilmuth that run the hardware and lumber yard, and this old man that lived in here, Old Man Crawford, worked for Beaty in the store there, and that's Steven's place there and here's where Wilmuth lived in this house here. (My, what a fine looking stone school building there to have to be abandoned.)

Sold for -- I think it was 49 hundred dollars.

(Talala School. That was a big thing, too.)

Yeah, there's an auditorium goes out the other way through there, and the doors open, but the gates locked, I guess. I didn't know it had that fence around it.

(Where did this stone come from?)

Oh, out here southwest of (not clear) most of it.

(That's a pretty thing. Pretty building.)

And it was just a shame to have to give it up. Yes sir it was.

(That's a crime almost.)

We went way down in east of Fort Smith to a sawmill and got lumber to build that there. Just got set up here pretty good and then there—things blowed up. Place there. Charlie Gilbreath place down here, there was a tornado went through here in '61. Just hit down there and new—had a big barn down here and it set the barn down for 'em. But it didn't hurt the house much. I think it took part of the shingles off the house.

Gilbreath and Bufler Baler were pretty big landowners and cattlemen when I come to this country. The youngest Gilbreath boy lives there now, Robert.
