(Apache name). They turn red see. They re ripe in September, October. You get them on your hands, you can't get them off. Them things, you can't see them. They dig in and they cause pus. Yeah, they get infection. Careful, get away from them. Some of those, I notice in Texas, I notice you just walk them so far, they just fly at you. Varieties of those that one, you seen those goatheads, they also got some. We call them part / near the same thing. I'll show you. Here's one. There's a big one. I don't know where it come from but it's a big one. You can dig it up now next spring, it will come up. That 's what it will look like. Like these aré pruple see. That's a good size one I'd say! (P. esculenta) You got to get them in April. In April and May and after that there's no use looking for them. So if you want to get them the season is in April and May. It's done been ripe here and broke off. That's their way, they blow away, you can't find them. I'd like to show you that one like a goathead. Boy, when they stick you you just hve to just like a magnet, you have to pull them off. This is similar to that (Apache name) but this is not it. Oh, got the same features and all that but it's not it. This one just goes so high.

RATTLES: (Baptisia spl)

(Walks to another area.)

These are rattles (another plant) I don't know they call them but the Indians use them when they get ripe. They will break them and use them for kids, you know. Babies. They got them modern now. Plastic. But Indians use and they make noise like a rattle snake.
