Stick through there (through seed pod) and you can make a top out of them. Spin them and have contests on them if you want to. They're not ripe yet. When they get ripe, they're about this big (about 1 inch diameter.) You get one of them balanced you hit them and boy they'll spin there four minutes.

(What do you call those?)

SOLANUM (Top):

Well, b o o (Spelled out) boo (boh)

(Is that the Apache name?)

Yeah. That means top. We'll all make one apiece and we'll wager, bet, one ~~feeder~~ or whatever it is. At the same time, but the one that spins the longest wins. It takes skill to make them balance, but these are a poor variety here. Where they grow taller and more firm you know what I mean, when it's perfect, those are the ones they use. But these they're wild. They're better in that wheat field. You see them in that wheat field? That's what they use. You see them in that sand country? You take them
