(And they favor eating a dog. Well, that's unusual.)

Their favorite meat is dog meat.

(And the regular panther, he likes colt, too.)

Yeah.

(Well, that's something new. I'm learning something all the time.)
He'll kill a lot of deer.

(0h, yéah.)

But if he can get a colt, ninety-nine times out of ten, where there's a lot of deer, you'll find panther.

(Yeah, well, there's lots of deer in the country now.)

Oh gosh, you could walk across from here to that door over there and never see no breaks. Cane breaks.

(I guess those cane breaks have been in this bottom...)

Always have.

(Always have. Well, they'll hide most anything.)

I'll tell you something else too, far out in the country those darned old bobcats. Trouble with bobcat and a panther, they can be in the country for years and a person never know it.

(Yeah. They're pretty wild, all right.)
