place to live.

That's what I'm thinking -- Indian down here, you know, he picked his best friend first. He pretty well know Indians, and he done something he ought not have done. He went -- they took him out jail, and let him take care of his business. Then, he stayed there and took care of his wife and all his family. Then, he told them, 'Well, I'll pick my best friend (not clear). He picked his best friend (not clear). A lot of these white people, they don't -- well, they're ashamed to mix with them.

(Yeah, they're just reluctant to mix with them 'cause you got two different societies altogether.)

I mean, that's only way I look at it because they think they're better.

They think they're better educated and if you want to insult an Indian, try to act on like he hasn't got education, because I had one Indian one time -- I didn't insinuate it. I didn't -- he just took it wrong way and he was almost going to fight me. It was Big Bear. I met him some time or another, and so I told him, I said, "No, I wasn't insulting you -- education at all." I said, "I was bragging on you the fact that you did have the opportunity to get your education (not clear)." And so, he accepted that apology and, of course, he started (not clear).

(Oh, yeah.)
