BATTLE OF MAYSVILLE

Christmas and so forth. But now, let's see. I think you can go right straight on out that way. (tape skip)--1862. He died a general. James Bell. came from the old Pea Ridge battlefield came over with Gen. Douglas H. Cooper. Col. Stand Watie, Indian regiment, at old Ft. Wayne across the line from Maysville. Now that's right down west of here. Against the second and third brigades. Benton. They moved toward Maysville crossing the prairie they found confederates lined up on ridge of timber 40 miles from town. Said they turned and they retreated in disorder followed by--

(Interruption)

(Battle of Maysville occurred on Oct. the 22nd, 1862 while Gen. James G. Blunt was encamped on the old Pea Ridge battle field. Word came that Gen Douglas H. Cooper and Col. Stand Watie regiment were at old Fort Wayne across the line from Maysville. On Oct 20, he advanced his second and third brigades to Bentonville. On Oct. 21, they moved towards Maysville. Crossing the prairie they found the confederate lines up on the edge of some timber a quarter mile from the town. Before his superior force they retreated in disorder followed by the Sixty Kansas Cavalry and the Third Cherokee Regiment for seven miles.
