(Did you live with your mother and father when you was young?)

Oh, (Creek)-- In 1917, when I left here (Creek). We didn't have any luxuries now (speaks Creek for remainder of sentence).

(Right by the fireplace?)

Yeah, right by the fireplace (Speaks in Creek).

(Well, where's this place you all live?)

Oh, way down north of Okemah about 15 miles. It's about a mile, two miles from Deep Fork River (finished sentence in Creek). There's one bad thing about that place where we live. It was a little too low. That's where the--where we live (Creek). That's where mosquitos were (Creek).

(That's about all of them taught didn't they?)

(Conversation in both English and Creek for a few sentences.)

(What was your father's name?)

James Porter.

(Your mother?)

Nancy Porter.

(How many were there in your family? You have brothers and sisters?)

Yeah, well, we was all living (finishes in Creek). Just two girls and two boys (finishes in Creek). Just three of us now. My brothers are killed (finishes in Creek).

(Did you say you graduated?)

I graduated from high school and Junior College at Bacone.

(Did you ever play football?)

I played four years. I didn't know anything about football and basketball. (Speaks in Creek)

(This doctor you were talking about, was he an Indian doctor that doctored you all--or a white doctor?)

He was Pawnee man. He was a doctor--a real doctor, but he didn't do any
