-- I think it was -- I think they call it Conners. It was a Conner family which is an old full-blood family. And that's the place cemetery belonged to (not clear). The best I remember when I was just a kid, it was just a -- oh, I can remember even some of the graves had logs -- logs up around them. (Kinda like a little house?)

Yeah, the house on some of these (not clear).

(Well, you know, I'd like -- well, they're all gone now.)

I hadn't been back there since I was a kid. I just remember what's left there. I'd like to sometime just go up there and see what it would be like. Of course, it was mostly Indians, well there's white people buried there, too, but a lot of Indians -- . Of course, the Balls Cemetery up here, I don't know whether you've ever heard of it. It's a -- of course, it's well kept cemetery. Just a while before he died, he gave them another eighty acres or so of ground there.

(Yeah, I know the Ball plot up there, it seems like it's one of the old --.)

It is. It's one.

(Of course, Al Spencer's buried there and (not clear). He's a Oklahoma outlaw, you know.)

That's what I was going to ask.
