Um-hmm, yeah, everything. They send them to Washington, the papers.

And this here boy--this here Wylie what I'm talking about. He took his last go 'round 'till his wife died. He stayed there. He went back.

(Oh, he went back as a teacher?)

No, I think he must have been a, I don't know what he was. He was kinda--I never did ask Wylie what he was.

(But he got married and went back up there?)

He was--he took his wife with him. And he took his whole family. He had family, didn't he?

He went back there.

(But he worked there. He did something.)

Yeah, he worked there, and, then, he lost his wife, I think. She died out there, didn't she?

Then, he brought her back--went blind.
