And they call us "They come from the Hot Country." They told us that when we got over there. They think we don't have no cold weather but we sure do. I told them, "We have cold weathers like you all." That them people over there they really have cold weather...

(How did you people get the name Comanche?)

I don't even know.

(Does it mean something?)

Comanche...it just mean Indians, Comanche Indians.

DANCES: GHOST DANCE, SUN DANCE

(I was sitting up there watching those dances tonight and I wanted to asked about what kind of dances they had when you were a young girl?)

They have the same dances, like these. These Kiowas--like that Gourd dance, the mens dance this evening, that's their dance. And they had Ghost Dance. That's the only two dances they ever had. Well, these Apaches, they had Ghost Dance and War Dance...that was their dance. Them two. But this Blackfoot Dance and we call, this Gourd Dance, our tribe we call it Crow dance. And then they have Round Dance. The Comanche and they have war dance and this Crow Dance and they...like this there's a group here of Indians in the night they would get on horses and sing through this...where they all camping. All just go round and round the camps you know, singing all night. Sitting on their horses, and riding and just go round and round. All those Indians, young men and womens...do that. And the old peoples don't do that. Most of the young peoples, way back in years, when I was small, we used to be camped up there at the post. And they do that all the time. Every night, bunch of them. Boys and young womens, they get on horses and sing around the camps all night...and do that, and in the morning all these chief's wives...like now they have club members and all these, what we call
