headmen are chief of their ances you know. And they all call them when they or the sun comes up and they all go over there and eat. And they sure like to do that because they eat when they go around that camp. Wall night singing---They don't do that anymore. You know they think its a lot of fun. Staying up all night around the night singing. Having drum. one of them carrying...
two or three of them, they carry drums. Thats the way they used to do.

(Did you ever see the Ghost Dance?)

Yeah, I seen one.

(what are they like?)

Oh, they just...these Apaches had a Ghost Dance...you know where Boone is?

That little store up there..right up ther north about two miles, oh that's where they have their Ghost Dance all the time. Theres all trese Apaches, theres a group of them you know...that's where they live, you know, they all..live in there. Round Boone. That is their place. And they have a dance and the Comanches always go see them, you know. And they have buckskin aresses, all the women...buckskin aresses. And they have a bir star, you know, right here (chest) and its painted red. And the man folks they have these beaver caps... looks like that and tassels back here, and then they have leggings and mocastins on, and they dance all night for about a week. That's their Ghost Dance. (For a week?)

For a week. They do that for a week they do that. They all camping over there.

That was their dance.

(Why did they call it Ghost Dance?)

They said...these medicine mans they dance all night and all night and way in the night they think they going to see their folks that pass a ay. They want to see them, that's why they dance like that. All night...that why they call it Ghost Dance. They think the dead people are going to come visit them or say something to them. And they want to see their fathers, or mothers,
