## T-591-2 (Second of Two Interview) Ethel McIntosh, Creek

(Ethel McIntosh lives near Eufaula Indian Boarding school at Eufaula, Oklahoma. She was born November 11, 1896. She is a widow moman. She lost her husband few years back. One of her older son lives with her. I told her I was going to interview her. She helped me such as telling how to make sofkey? That is Indian food made of corp. She wanted to read a book and tell me about two boys running away from home but I went an ahead and took her recording.)

I got a letter from Midwest City and they wanted Indian recipes but I was so sick I didn't send anything. I don't know if anything was sent or not.

(I told her I took Katie's recording and she had a lot to say.)

She likes to talk a lot, I guess she had a lot to say. And I guess she knows a lot of things.

(I told her she can talk in Creek or English.)

What if I talk just in Creek are you going keep it yourself?

(I'll keep it and then they listen to it at Indian Education.--I had to explain to her, same as others I've interviewed, because a lot of them don't understand.)

I'll read up a book (old book) that I have, if I can find it, about two boys who ran away from home but came back because they didn't know any better.)

(Alright, but first I'll asked you, where you were born, and several other things.)

I was born near West Eufaula Indian Baptist Church. That house is not there now. One Saturday, my mother said she was in labor, about that time, some colored people were passing by in a wagon. She knew this big woman, her name was Mary Dunlap. She helped many women during their child birth. So she stopped them, at first she noticed a wagon coming, but the dust behind them. She asked Mary to be with her cause she was in labor. I was born
