And he married this, some of the Armstrongs.

(Was John Chambers also, that lived over on the river?)

Then Pauline. She married twice. And she /words not clear/. She
belonged to the Parker family. And Mrs. Parker was a, she was a Chambers,
I think. Now she can set you straight on those. Cora Parker. She
has a brother that lives right by the, right next to the Parker place
there's a little house. And that's her brother, Roy.

(Do you recall a long time ago the Indian families of McCoy?)

Yes. Aunt Mary McCoy.

(Yes.)

Lived here.

(All up on the creek there.)

Yes. Aunt Mary McCoy. They called it Kephart Springs. She was in that neighborhood. McCoy.

(Connected with that McCoy family, was there some--the Henry family?)
Well, there was Hag Henry.

(Yes. Indian families.)

Yes. There was some /words not clear/.

(Yes.)

RECALLS OWN FAMILY GENERATIONS

And my grandmother was Aunt Nancy Connor. But she had married soon after the Civil War. And the soldiers were coming across, you know, in the county. Father was named Collins. She was a Collins. Her maiden name was Collins. And my mother first married George Collings. And he wa a Cherokee. And he had — so then after the war he had—well, there was a fort. Fort Lincoln was up around Kansas there. And James Connor. Grandma first married /name not clear/. And Ida Mae Collins was her first child. And she was six months old when they came down from Kansas.
