E. W. Vocaelin' Consequent Contributions from the Museum of Anthropology of the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

This is probably the best account of Shawnee life and culture before 1830, and is based on information obtained from Tenskatawa and Black Hoof. A xeroxed copy of this short volume is in the Phillips Collection of the university library.

Tucker, Glenn. Tecumseh, Vision of Glory. Indianapolis: Bobbs-Merrill Co. 399 pp. 1956.

This is probably the best biography of Tecumseh and description of the times in which he lived and problems facing the Indians with the advancement of American settlements into the Obso country. Written by a professional historian. The university copy of this book is in the Phillips Collection and can be used there but not checked out.

Wright, Muriel H., A Guide to the Indian Tribes of Oklahoma. Norman:
University of Oklahoma Press. 300 pp. 1951.

This book is a handy reference book for a condensed version of the history of the various Indian tribes of Oklahoma. The introductory chapter also has good background information on how Oklahoma became the home of so many different tribes, and also a good sketch of government Indian policy. Most of the information is arranged according to tribes which are listed in alphabetical order. There is a section on the Shawness. Related information can be found in the sections on the Cherokees and the Delawares.
