So. I guess, maybe, they do it. Maybe, they don't, but I know we've heard stories about them long time ago. Some of them go to different homes, and all they want it seems like, was something to eat, you know. And, of sourse, they say if you ever come, meet one, tell him to, you know, don't bother and so on about his business. That's the way they tell us to talk to him, you know, just in a nice way. Don't, we have a lot of those stories among our people. I guess, them, I don't know, I haven't experienced nothing like that myself and they say they exist. And they're Indians, you know. So, I don't know. That's what, you know, reople are interested in that kind, kind of story. But it happened recently over there around home there. So, I don't know. We don't question these ways so much, just what we been told. So, that's, I know there are people interested in that. I don't know why so much, but I guess they hear about these things and they wanna know. That's far as I know, and I reckon kind of related stories like that to us. They also kinda verify some of this, you know. But they always tell us just to, don't think about it too much.)

STORY, ABOUT A SLEEP WALKER

My father told us of a story of a certain man back there when all our people were living up in the north, north part of the United States.

And talk about what you call it, sleepwalking, well, I've seen that a lot when I was in church and things like that but this story, course, it's a true story, told from generation to generation and got to my father and he told us about, my son knows more about these things than I do. He pays more attention to his grandpa than I did, I guess. He lives in (not clear), but you know, I guess he's forgotten a lot of them cause he lives among white people for so many years. He's been
