

(What were their names?)

One of my grandmother's name was Pumpkin. I told you one time. That's Sitting Bull's sister. His wife's name was Dropping Lip. He brought her from Wyoming. She was a Wyoming woman--Arapaho, yeah.

(What about the other wife?)

The other wife was her sister. Her name was Short Nose. In Arapaho that's d̥ɛbi.θeɪ̃ -- d̥ɛbĩ iθeɪ̃ He married sisters.

(Did he tell any story about how he met his wives and married them?)

No. He never did tell us how he met his wives. But when they came they already had--well, one had three kids and the other one, I think, had four. When they come.

(Were they his kids?)

They were just kids. They came down on horseback.

(I mean, were they Sitting Bull's children or were they some other man's?)

Oh, they were his children--from both of them. The oldest one was Moses, I think, was his name. Moses. And then this--my aunt, (Lydia)--used to be Wilbert Tabor's wife, and then there was Joe. All from one woman. And there was Donald--Donna--a girl, from the other woman. And the boy was Stacy. He's living yet. And Andrew. (See T-453 for Myrtle's genealogy.)

(Was Sitting Bull from the north, too?)

No. He was from here. He was from here and when they went out, you know, to fight, he drifted to Wyoming with the other Arapahoes and got married over there.

(He stayed up there, then, for quite a while?)

He stayed up there for quite a while. That's where he got this Ghost
