Called the Old Mikko Ferry. One girl living, that she says about Mikko, she lives in Tulsa. And I don't think she knows any thing (not clear)

(Ah-huh)

Handling the mike, makes difficult to hear.

(That was way before statehood then, wasn't it?)

Yeah.

(Ah-hum)

And then, down in that general area, one mile when you make this road, down here. One mile east and a mile north and then back east back in that sand hills, there is another cemetery there.

(Hum)

And I don't know, whose that is. It's been there for years and years.

And I know some of my folks, been buried there. And well my uncle's son been buried there. I don't know.
