John Reynolds lives now. And John barbered here awhile and raised his family. That's Lee Dahl's and Peg's father, you know.

(Who's father?)

That's Lee Dahl's and Peg's father, John Pettit.

(John, huh, oh.)

And he was old Judge Pettit's second boy. He was younger than Charlie Pettit. You remember hearing Charlie Pettit?

(Yeah.)

And, oh, are all of these old Indians lived around on the reservation at one time, well, they got them a allotment.

Well, oh, Jack Wheeler lived over here at Gray Horse for years and years. I don't know whether he owned any land or not, but old Jack's original allotment was right over here close to Big Hominy bridge right where Ken Reed's lives. That's was his original allotment, but he lives for a long time on that Gray Horse, and...

(Wasn't that old man'--what's that old man Wheeler's name?

It's Ridges's brother now. He was over from around that way,

wasn't he?)

I never did know him. I never did know him. You see, I lost track. I have to think here. In 1915, course, I left here.

I never moved back here till 1954. That was thirty-nine years.

(Oh.)

I was away, but seven years of that time, I lived on the Osage.

So, I was in contact with Hominy, but I never lived here.

(Well, what kind--how long did your father worked for this Mr. Pettit?)

Oh, I don't have any idea how long for--is when he was a boy.

And he, my father had so many brothers and sisters, and his
