IRENE'S EXPERIENCE TRYING TO BUILD A HOME IN ANADARKO

Jordan: You bought the house?

Irene: No, I bought the lot. There was an old house on it. And it was just all run down. We tore it down to build a house there. And I even bought my own plans. They cost me forty-seven-fifty--just the plans. I have that.

Jordan: How much did the lot cost?

Irene: Well, there's five heirs and they took my share out and I paid five-sixty (\$560). They gave us (the five heirs) seven hundred and some-odd dollars. See they keep two hundred and something off of that. (The \$700+ dollars was paid to the five heirs. Deducting Irene's share of this, she paid an additional \$560 for the 50x50 lot.) The whole lot cost seven hundred and sixty dollars, I guess. Must have been about two-fifty (\$250) my share. Anyway, the whole amount was seven hundred and something, but when I paid my three brothers and my sister, well, I paid them five hundred and sixty dollars. And then when I went back, the Agency said that I didn't have--I had to have a hundred by--a hundred and fifty feet by--you know--so many feet wide. And I didn't have no loan value on that place that I bought. Now the lot is just setting there and I can't build a home on it.

Jordan: Where did you get the plans?

Irene: Oklahoma City. They wanted to use their own plans (the Agency). The Agency wanted to. I didn't like their plans. So they sent me west of Carnegie to look at some people's house and I didn't like the house.

Jordan: Was that house built with Agency plans?
