And then when the boys come, just whatever the president says to give them--maybe give them ten dollars or five dollars or eight dollars or something like that. And then the boys that are just leaving, they used to give them five.

(Whose idea was it to form a club like that?)

Well, it was Armstrong Spotted Horse's idea.

(Now that's Saul Birdshead?)

Yeah, Saul Birdshead. He said we ought to have a club. That's the first boy we lost in this groups, he said. So we had a club. He was the first one missing--my boy. And they call it "Lewis Howling Buffalo Club."

(Were there any Cheyennes in it or was it all Arapaho?)

There was Minnie Strongwolf and her mother. And Maud Sevier was in there, and David Panman and his mother was in there. And the Walkers. We had about six Cheyenne people. And they are all gone.
