away sometime ago -- not too long ago.

(Do the Neidifer's have a family cemetery?)

Yes. It's--they used to be a little town--little train stop, called Traber out here, south and east of Miami and that's called the Neidifer cemetery. Uncle Sam gave the allotment. Mr. Byrd first owned the land, and then my uncle Sam Neidifer bought it and they gave this plot for the--no one is buried out there but Indians. It's not in too good shape.

(How far is it from Fariland?)

Well, it's closer to Miami than it is Fairland. It's about--about three miles and a half south and east of Miami.

(The reason I asked, is some of these cemeteries are being forgotten, especially Indian cemeteries. And there is a move to locate them and mark them.)

Well, the Neidifer's have fenced their lots in and they have—they take care of it, but the others—there's quite a few out there. 'Course I don't suppose they're anyone left to take care of them. And we've tried several times to get people that was connected with people that was buried there to take an interest and try to do something about the cemetery, but it just didn't materialize. No one wasn't that interested.
