(If a child was orphaned and someone in the family should take the child and raise it, what relative would be the one that people would expect to take it?)

Well, a grandmother or aunt or sister--if she has older sister or anything like that. Decide among the relations who used to raise them.

(Would it make any difference if it was the child's own grandmother or whether it was a grandmother's sister or something like that?)

It didn't make any difference. They took care of them.

(Did it ever happen that maybe there weren't enough relatives to take care of a child like that and maybe some distant relations had to take them?)

I don't know. I never did know--oh yes I did. There was one man--he was about the same age with me--this Dan Black Horse. And when he was born his mother died. I guess we were born the same day.

And there was another woman--she lost her baby that day. And

then this Dan Black Horse's father, after they buried his mother,

he went over there to that woman. He took some things. And horses over there. And asked her if she could go on ahead and nurse him.
