love one another and look out for each other. But they never did run around together, their brothers.

(Would they ever tease each other or joke with each other?)
Oh, they might joke, but I don't know how they would—
(Did an older brother maybe ever give advice to his younger brother or try to show him how to do things?)
No.

(For a boy, then, which of his relatives might give him advice?) Well, the older people—their folks—was the ones that used to give advice. And the same advice to the oldest and to the youngest.

Would a mother ever give advice to her son?)
Yeah.

(Would a father ever give advice to his daughter?)

Yeah. They give advice to all their children--even down to their grandchildren--the older ones.

(What's the kind of things that a father might tell his daughter?)
Oh, just tell her to be good and behave and try to help her
mother and all that. That's all.

(Interruption)

(Now a boy's boy cousins--I guess he'd call them brothers--)
Yeah.

(Would he ever run around with them and play with them?)
Yeah, they play together.

(Would these be cousins of his own age or younger or older--?) Well, same age.

(When the kids were playing, did they mostly play with kids of their own age or would there ever be like a mixed group with kids of all ages?)

Yeah, they always play that way--mixed. They don't have to be all the same age.

(Well, a boy with his boy cousins—if they're older than he is, would he sort of run around with them or joke with them?)
Yeah.

(What if they're younger than he is--would he treat them any certain way?)
