They give out commodities over there and they go to Canton, I think.

They give them--different districts, I think they give them.

(I was at a dance the other night and the NC said he was going to ask for a song for all the Cheyenne in the audience. He said that just by looking around he could tell their were a lot of Cheyenne there. How could he tell just by looking?)
