

himself. The people across the street was watching. And they sent word to the Agency Office that a man shot himself right over there. So we all ran out there and I ran out there. He was dead. Ben Popejoy.

(Was he Kiowa?)

White man. That's the reason I say, I don't remember. Well, it was that girl's sweetheart that got shot and died. Might be that, I don't know. But it happened right in there around Anadarko. I don't know about any other man being shot at that time--I don't remember. Those were all the people that were shot and died right in around at that time, that I've given you all those people. But there's others that died earlier, but they was white people. Just after the opening the first sheriff of Caddo County and the Undersheriff--I told you about that--they had those men, outlaws, in their building and both of them rode right up to the building and the undersheriff, George Bent, was riding a black horse and his horse was shot under him, and the sheriff on a white horse drove right up on the door front and demanded them to surrender (Guy has told this story more fully in an earlier interview) and they shot through the door and killed the horse and him, too. But that was after 1902. And this is happened after 1911.

ANDY DOMEBO'S WIFE
