We lived right close to creek there next to the forest and he had a dog and he goes out and brings in coons. Yeah, early days, they ate coons.

(How old were you at this time?)

I can't hardly give it to you, but I was pretty small then. Yeah, that's before I started to school.

(Was Kuyotte living at that time?)

Yes.

(When did he die?)

They have a record of that, but he died just a little before the country opened. He didn't draw no allotment. He died before the country opened.

(Do you remember what his brother's name was--what his Mexican name was or anything?)

No, I don't. I tried to get it later on, after another man--a Mexican--came from that same territory. And I tried to get the name and he did call him--but I can't hardly pronounce it--it's a Mexican name. He called him Forlores or something like that--Forlores--Porfolio--something like that.
