and just dig the dirt away and the rawhide and just jerked it off with his testh. And there was a man down there. And he said each wolf would drop their tail down in the hole and ask the man to catch hold of the tail and see if he could pull him up. He can't reach it, so two or three wolves join tails together -- bits and hold them by the tail -- and they got that man to get a tail and they pull him out of the hole. Saved him. And they adopted him. And that's the story about the wolf boy. The wolf boy finally lived with the welves. That grandps welf that saved him was a lobe welf--a big one. learned the wolf language. And he lived with them. And they run around and esten these young deers and everything and he ests them. And they go around and he got fleet of foot just like a wolf and would stay up with them. they'd chase buffalo and they kill buffalo and he sat the meat raw like the other wolves. But he still remember his life when he was human and the Kiowas, they take the buffalo legs and take the bone and take the meat off the bone and they break the leg and then they draw the marrow out of it. And eat that. And story was when they coyotes went close to where they had a buffalo chase, close to camp, and the village was camped not too far away. And in the night when it was kinds damp and it carried the echo way off, somebody went outside and she heard them wolves over there where the carcass was left after the buffalo chase. And she heard somebody tapping on a--buffalo head, on the horn That young man, he was breaking the leg, the shin bome, right in the middle. On the buffalo norm. And somebody was curious and went over there and they sow it was this young man with the wolves. And the wolves were howling around, talking. He know what they were saying all the time. And that young man reported to the village that the wolf boy comes to the carcaes. And said they probably adopted him and he runs with them. He calls the wolf "daddy." And the wolf understand his language, too, and they talk to each other. The people
