This man, his wife--one of his little girls--his daughter--I gues's she used to pee on the bed all the time. And my grand-mother, I guess she told her to get rabbit manure and give it to her. I guess she just laugh and laugh. She didn't believe it. "Try it," I guess she told her. So I guess she pick up some. She went and boiled it and twice she give it to her daughter. And she quit. She used to tell everybody, that woman, "Get rabbit--!" (Laughs)

(Did it just have to be a jackrabbit rather than a cottontail?)

Any kind of a rabbit, you know. They used to do that. They used to boil them and give them the water of that and it used to make them quit wetting the bed. She used to tell me lot of things like that.

(Is this your grandma, Pumpkin, that was telling you that?)
Yeah, it was her. She used to tell me that.

(You learned a lot of things from her?)

Yeah, from her. And my grandpa, he used to tell us war stories. Oh, some of them were pitiful. I used to cry when he comes to the pitiful part. How they used to treat them and how they, you know, how they kill them and all that. He used to tell us lot of pitiful stories.

(Can you remember any of the things that he would tell about?)
Oh, not very many of them. I wasn't so big when he used to tell
us. As soon as he tell that he shot him and scalped and all
that, then I used to start crying. Yeah. And part of the time
I didn't listen to them. But one time he was telling us, it's
over here at Waynoka, somewhere. I guess they had a fight with
the Cheyennes. These Arapahoes. And they chase them out of
some part of the country. And I guess there was this hill. I
guess it was just like a cave, like. Just my grandfather and
another man, his name was Heap of Crows, I guess he said, "Here
is a woman. She's got two kids—two boys." I guess they run,
you know. They used go afoot. They run. And this woman was
going under. And I guess my grandfather, he grabbed her, some—
where on her dress, and throw her out. And one of her little
