and they use that for an old cattle trail called the Chisholm Trail and it was the Chisholm Trail. The Chisholm Trail come up to Chickasha and come right up to the Washita River. Then cross the Washita River right down here at Røck Cross then right up here at Mountain view, but I think it was down here. Went by a little gld store, David Cloudchief. Course, there wouldn't no settlement then, but them towns is built an cattle trail, them stores, you know? So they can get trade. Cause imigrates have traveled the trail with wagons. Then from that, west of old Butler, little town called Butler, then it turns straight north from Butler to Fort Supply, on the east side of Fort Supply on--in to Dodge City. Well, they never trailed any cattle to Kansas City because there wouldn't no packin' house you see? And after they got packin' houses, then they trailed cattle up that old military trail that was razed out by General Leavenworth, see? And lot of people think that is the old cattle trail. I wasn't, old Chisholm Trail, it wouldn't the Chisholm Trail, because the Chisholm Trail come across this way. Then after John Chisholm went into Coleman County, he blazed out another trail, south of Altus. It goes by the name of Old --- I've been there, and on the Texas side there was a store and a blacksmith's shop. And that was used, had John Chisholm crossed that river there at that old crossin', Dome's Crossing and come on up by Lone Wolf had intersect in the old--Denton County town about--(unintelligible) is now.

And, but they write big stories about it and I'm, be eighty-four years old and been here all my life and I know something about Oklahoma. And I been all over it. And I went back over part of it since I been livin'
