But somehow they'll finish, they'll finish a game. Well, they play it that way. They, then my mother, she play. She play, you know, her game. Well, she use a five, put in five, you know. She -- she took out two in there.

Sometime, she don't.

(Yes.)

But they use them arrows. I guess you saw them.

(Yeah.)

I think they use ten, ten arrows to, they have five on this side and five on this side.

(Yeah, she played five games. Then, some of them play four. You took out, but them don't play that way, you know. It takes too long. This other way, you know, it's, it's a -- Pawnees play it that way.

(Yes.)

They just, you know, first one, you know, puts in, you know, wins a game, well, they win.

(Yes.)

But there were -- oh, there was lots to that game, you know. See, lot of time, you know, they have feast after, you know, the game. Maybe, the next day, but there's times, you know, I seen them old, old Indians play. Sometimes, they match a game. Well, they say, "Well, we're going bake bread, corn bread. We're going to bake that kind, you know."

(Yeah.)

Both sides, they get a somebody, you know, to keep the sticks, keep track, you know. So, when that's finished, maybe, they're going to have feast, maybe three, four, five days afterwards, after the game. Well, it's a -- the one that handles the sticks, you know, they all give her to return thanks for that what they're playing for, you know. But nowadays, they don't do that.
