I don't remember, but he's Lipan Apache. Of course, I told this story before, and named him wrong before, but he called his name right. Oh....I heard his name many times but I can't keep it up there---(pointed to his head.) I asked my uncle here not too long ago, uh...this fellow brought this medicine and he told me his name and as quick as he told me, well, I forgot. We all know, Apaches that use this herb. This fellow that showed the Apaches how it's used. From that time on they made what they call peyote rules. They ah...make not rules but regulations.

'(What are some of these regulations?)

It's not regulations but some of the things that's kind of routine.

In the beginning they all march in and take tobacco.

(About what time do they go in?)

Oh, they go in about dusk and take tobacco and pass it all around and everybody smoke together.

(Which way is the tobacco passed?)

Uh...passed through the door on this side. (The door is on the east, and passed from the left side around.) They move towards the left and then come around. That's everything that moves in it. They start from the door and they...well there's all types of ways they...it's all according to the way the leader runs his ceremonies. Sometimes they start from where he sits.

(Where does the leader sit?)

The door is here (on the east) and on the west: His assistant sits
