(After--after they got to where they were going, did they ever--did they, you know--what they do to cool off or---?)

Oh, they just have to -- I don't know. They just have to, you know, rest up.

(Yeah. Did they eat?)

I don't think so.

(Yeah.)

They just go, you know, rest.

(I'm going to--I'm going to move this. I think the wind's blowing on it.

(Interruption) Not having very good luck. There we go. And you--you
don't know what this--this--that word (Wichita Indian word)--what that
means? It just means a race, huh?)

Well, that's where I don't understand. I just know, you know, they say that.

(Yeah.)

I don't really understand what it means, you know. Bertha might know, you know Bertha Provost.

(Yeah.)

She might know about why we call it (Wichita Indian word).

"SHINNEY WICHITA BALL GAME,

(Yeah. Okay, how about Shinney then?)

Well, (Wichita Indian word), it's a--they do that. You know, they get a bunch of, you know, young man, old man, you know, that wants to take part, which side, you know. They don't--they don't--no, they don't select their, you know, man.

(Yeah.)

They just get on which side you want, just kind of divide them up.
