Uhuh. See, you don't dance with your relations. You dance with some.. there were a lot of people there, so they went and got the outsiders or your distant cousins. Sisters-in-law and brotheres-in-law.

(Would the man have to dance with the woman?)

Yes, or otherwise, he'd have to pay her. You don't want to go, all you got to do is pay up, even a nickle. You're feeding those turkey necks.

(Is there any reason why they call the men turkey necks?)

Well, that's the name of the dance, that part of the dance. (Caddo word)
