an Osage Indian from Pawhuska, who will be 80 years old next July 17.
Mrs. Hill is going to talk about her early life at Pawhuska and largely
about the religious life of the Osages.)
Where was I born?
(Uh-huh.)
I was born five miles northwest of Pawhuska. There's my alloted land
which I still have.
(What was your father's name?)
My father's name, and English name, was known as Antoine Albert. His
Osage name was?
(Both your father and your mother.)
And my mother's name was?
(They were educated where?)
My father - mother- They were both educated in Carlisle, Pennsylvania
Indian School.
(Now -)
This, I was told by my aunt, my mother's sister was her
name. That was my aunt's name.
(Now as a child, you were talking about you and an older brother.)
As a child, mother had died and we were young. And my father took us
over and lived with some white people by the name of McClinick. They lived
in one part of the house and my father and my brother and I lived in the
other part. Northwest of town right here yet, you know. And I was born in
1887.
