And when we all went to bed, well, the little ones would go to bed first, and they had their own prayers. And us bigger girls, well we had our own prayers. But I don't know if my own grandkids pray at school before they eat. I don't know. Maybe they do, I don't know...I never did hear them say. But really, they should get same kind of training like I did when I went to school.
