They fix it like that and that's for their winter, and they pile it up oh, about that high you know when they cut it up and they pile it up and that was for their winter wood.

(Did it generally last all winter?),

Yeah. It lasts all winter, but still they just go after some more.

Their woods just pile up. I would go with them and I just be in their way I guess cause they always tell me, "Get away or your' going to

get hurt." Well, everytime they start their wagon going down to the creek for wood, I just get in and follow them around wherever they go.

When we go to town she would buy great big sack of candy and then dried prunes or dry peaches or dried apples. She, oh, she buys a great big bunch of them and then she saves all those for the winter months, and then I know she got it and then everytime I sit down by her she'd be sewing either moccasins or she'd be doing...she learned me how to sew moccasins too when I was real small.

LEARNING TO MAKE MOCCASINS:

Yeah, she learned me how to make moccasins, she learned me how to bead work, all those things like that I learned from her and she had sinews you know. She'd sew the soles onto the buckskin when she's making moccasins, they sewed with sinews. She makes thread out of them about that long, you know. She tears them off and makes thread and then she had a little outfit about that long, it's pointed it's made out of
