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(Does he make the tea before he goes over there to cure them?) Yeah, or sometimes he's over there, he tells the mother or someone to heat up some water, boil it, and he's going to use this. And he's got medicine tied up in different buckskins and he knows just (which is which. Now my brother's still got some, but we don't know what which is which. He's got the bags, my brother has. (Do you think your brother would ever let me look at it?) I don't know. Oh, I tell you, I don't know unless I go with you. Right now he hurt himself. He's been sick and has heart trouble. And three days ago they say he had a light heart attack and they find him laying out there and he's in the hospital right now at Carnegie. I guess he fell hard and like to broke his back and he can't move. I'm planning to go see him tonight. (The reason I asked is because I've been real interested in medicine and doctoring and I've worked on this before and I'm just always interested in learning anything I can about the medicine.) Well, he's got the medicine since our dad passed away. He's got the bag. He's got everything. Course, he's a man, like I say. There's two of us, just me and him and he's got everything. (Does he have a son?) Yeah, he's got boys. He's got three boys. Whenever he's gone,

well, one of them gets it.

(That's what I was wondering?)

You know, now everything is just changing. I don't know, it might be that sometime they might just put it somewhere. I told my brother, I said, "Why don't we take it to some museum and let it be there for safekeeping. In the future it'll be there right out of history and just leave it there for people to see what they used
