

I guess I must be about six or seven days old when we left Ft. Sill and we came. My grandfather used to live up here by Mt. Scott...this side of Mt. Scott and that's where we used to live. As soon as I got old enough, we were living over there before I went to school. I was real small. We live there with my grandfather and after that, when I was six years old, we still live there. When I got seven years old, my dad came down here to our place this was our own allotment you know...and then he came and built that home and then we moved down here.. We never did go back there. When I start school over here...I went to school and all those years I stayed in school until I quit school and got married.

CACHE CREEK SCHOOL:

(Which school was that?)

Up there...that mission school: It's four miles from here. The name of it was Cache Creek Mission School. Right there on Cache Creek.

(Did you stay there?)

Yeah, I stay there all the time. I never did go. All the kids that were in school, they stayed there everyday and they eat there. They don't go home. They just keep us there. In May the school closed and our parents bring us home. We stay for the summer and then we go back to school stay all winter.

(Were there any other tribes there, other than Comanche?)

Yeah, there was Kiowas and Apaches.

(How did you like it?)

I like it. I really did enjoy that school.

(Were the teachers missionaries or...)

aThey were all missionaries. Everyone of them and our superintendent he was a preacher...him and his wife, they were really nice people.
