when I talk to you. He said they does that.

SHE WAS TOUGH, TOO. SHE WAS A BULL RIDER AND RACE HORSE JOCKEY

(When did you, you were telling me the other day that you rode bulls. When did you first do that?)

Yeah. When I first done that I was, I guess I was just crazy goofy. Boy, I tell you, we was just raised up with horses. Everybody knows us in our tribe. All these two men of kids raised up with horses. And so I, oh, I rode bulls, ride horses and all of that 'till I was about, oh well, until I got married. I just quit then. I started riding them when I was about eight years old. And...

(Bulls?)

Yeah. And I was jockey too, and see my dad, he's got lot of race horses. We just growed up with horses and all of that. Un- I rode them, too, and I just quit then as I got old. I guess I still could ride a horse if I wanted to but since I got kids, why I don't care then. Now I got a baby boy, he's a bull rider. (Unclear) he's a bull rider, he's a jockey, everybody knows he's a bull rider around here, all these white people.

(He rides in rodeos?)

Rides in rodeos. He just chase the rodeos all over. Last year he went to Burkhurnett he won seven hundred and some odd dollars there. When they ride bulls, well, after they get through they give them a (unclear) on top of that, they get through, they hold them jackpots. You know what that means? They bet one another and one person wins they all get money. That's what he done, that jackpot. But I've got another nephew but he's uh-he's uh- what you call it uh- he- rides horses, bareback, bronc rider. He's a bronc rider that's what he is. But my boy is a bull rider but he's a bronc rider. He went to, went to Taos, Taos I think it was, semewhere up west. During fourth of July they go there week vacation then go back. See, they both works at Sequoyah Mill now.
